PURDUE UNIVERSITY

The School of Veterinary Medicine is found on the Purdue campus in West Lafayette, Indiana. The twin cities of Lafayette-West Lafayette are situated in northwest Indiana, 60 miles from Indianapolis and 150 miles from Chicago. The Veterinary Medical Complex which includes a teaching hospital and biomedical research information center is situated on the southern edge of campus along with the state-of-the-art Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory.

CURRICULUM: The program leading to the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree is four years in length. The curriculum **incorporates** several courses with problem-based learning **during the first two years of the program**. Students will have the opportunity to enhance their basic core courses with electives that provide for a more individualized educational experience, especially in the third year of the program, and better prepare them for the final year of clinical rotations.

ADMISSION PROCESS: All applicants must apply through VMCAS. **No supplemental application is necessary.** Completed applications are reviewed by the admissions committee **during November and December**. Interviews are a required part of the process and are conducted in late February for invited applicants only.

NOTE: It is strongly recommended that you deliver your application to VMCAS at least one week before the deadline to avoid web congestion. Web congestion causes severe delays in completing the web application which could cause you to miss the deadline.

SIZE OF ENTERING CLASS: 70

DEADLINE DATE: October 2, 2008.

CLASSES BEGIN: late August

SUPPLEMENTAL PROCESSING FEE: none

ADMISSION DEPOSIT: A non-refundable deposit (\$250 for residents; \$1,000 for non-residents) is required to hold a position in the class and will be credited toward tuition and fees at matriculation.

TUITION AND FEES: 2007-08 \$15,052 resident; \$35,918 non-resident (subject to change for 2008-2009)

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Preference is given to Indiana residents. The remainder of the class is selected from at-large applicants across the United States and around the world. There is no supplemental application. A baccalaureate degree is not required; however, many applicants do have at least four or more years of college work. A minimum grade point average of 3.00 on a scale of 4.00 is required for non-resident applicants to be eligible for admission consideration. Any grade lower than 2.00 (C) in the required courses is unacceptable. All required courses attempted will be included in the core GPA calculations.

Scores from the Graduate Record Examination (GRE[®]) General Test are required (use GRE[®] institution code 1573.)

Academic transcripts and GRE scores should be submitted directly to the School of Veterinary Medicine no earlier than July 1 and NO LATER THAN November 1. Do not submit GRE scores to the Graduate School.

Evaluations should be submitted to VMCAS, along with your application, and should include at least one from a veterinarian.

Prerequisite courses for entrance into the school must include complete coverage of the content area through a 2 semester sequence or a 1 semester stand alone course
